Beyond the direct employment at the mining sites, there's a ripple effect—contractors, truck drivers, security personnel, and even local businesses find new opportunities as the industry's needs grow. For Spur, the presence of Galaxy's mining operation has translated into not just jobs but a sense of hope and possibility.

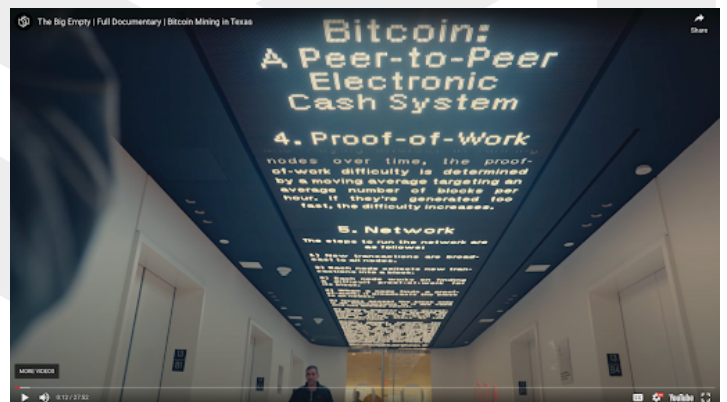
